Research Australia University Roundtable Charter

Role:

The Research Australia University Roundtable (the Roundtable), a committee of Research Australia, provides a forum for discussion of matters of relevance to the University members of Research Australia.

Authority:

The Roundtable has no formal authority to act for or on behalf of Research Australia.

Responsibilities

- Be a forum to represent university members of Research Australia.
- Consider and provide advice to Research Australia to inform Research Australia's strategy, policy and advocacy.
- Identify and advance the current issues for universities in health and medical research.
- Encourage engagement between universities and the broader health and medical research sector
- Provide opportunities for universities to work more closely with Research Australia.

Membership:

The membership of the Roundtable consists of the individuals nominated by the universities that are members of Research Australia. Each university is entitled to nominate one member of the Roundtable. The individual nominated by each university should have the capacity to influence policy within their institution. The Chairman of Research Australia will nominate a Chair of the Roundtable from time to time.

Conduct of Meeting:

The Roundtable will meet at least three times per year face to face or by telephone as appropriate. All meetings will be conducted in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Constitution. The Chairperson will be responsible for the orderly conduct of the meetings and for pursuing the Roundtable's responsibilities as outlined above.

Reporting and accountability:

The Roundtable will provide a report on its activities to each meeting of the Board of Research Australia. The Chair of the Roundtable will sign minutes of the Roundtable's meetings in accordance with Clause 15.13 of the Constitution.

Review of Charter:

The Roundtable shall review this Charter at least annually and may recommend to the Board any changes to the Charter that it considers appropriate. The Board shall also review the Charter at least annually, and will consider the recommendations for change, if any, from the Roundtable. The Board may amend the Charter at any time and in such manner as it determines.
